Congratulations to Clarksville High School and its two state championship wins.

The Girls Golf Team won its third state championship in October with Mariah Smith winning the individual state title. Team members include: Riley Cooper, McKinely Cunningham, Mariah Smith, Cameron Waltman, Kallie Robertson, Madison Averitt and Cassidy Marcom. Their coach is J.T. Batson.

The Girls Soccer team has won the state championship twice out of the last three years. Their coach is Jeff Jordan with assistant coach Sara Klutzz. Clarksville High School Business Academy students were given the opportunity to participate in the Chick-fil-a Leader Academy. Chick-fil-A Leader Academy is a national high school leadership program focused on impact through action. Local franchise owner David Blevins arranged for the students to have the enriching experience with business education teacher Dr. Diarese George.

The Downtown Kiwanis Club of Clarksville, in partnership with the Clarksville-Montgomery County Education Foundation, has provided free books to all 3,000 third graders in the Clarksville-Montgomery County School System. Reading Rodeo, a new event presented by the Downtown Kiwanis Club, kicked off on Oct. 27 at Byrns Darden Elementary School.

While the Reading Rodeo program is new this year, Downtown Kiwanis Club has donated more than 100,000 books to CMCSS students over the past 30 years. The name of the program incorporates the Kiwanis Rodeo, which is a fundraiser that has helped to purchase the books. Reading Rodeo is made possible through a grant from the UPS Foundation, and funding from an anonymous donor who loves children and reading.

CMCSS wants to recognize and honor the first time 2016 STEM and Academy Externship Partners who hosted teachers at their businesses or organizations last summer. New to the externship host program for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math are: Bridgestone Metalpha, The Clarksville Foundry, Inc., The Food Initiative, Tennessee Wildlife Refuge, Robard's Pest Control, and the Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) Nashville Field Office.

New to the Academies externship program are: the CMCSS Business Affairs Office and the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office. Several of the other extern hosts are not new since they hosted STEM teachers last year.
